Salle 3-4: Alois Lichtsteiner. It Is Not What It Is

Introduction

The Swiss painter and graphic and object artist Alois Lichtsteiner premiered a group of monumental paintings at the Museum Franz Gertsch, which mark the key moments in his painterly quest. Comprising a selection of works from the past forty years, the show also revisit the beginnings of the artist's exploration of this theme in the 1980s and follow his journey from colour to shades of grey and back to colour.

Lichtsteiner, who is primarily known for his series of "Birch" and "Mountain" paintings in shades of grey with white backgrounds, created very colourful paintings in the 1980s. In a time when painting was written off in favour of other, new forms of art, he continued to pursue his desire to paint by looking for conceptual forms of expression and an individual way out of this situation.

The programmatic piece "Tot aufgefunden (AL1983.002)" ["Found Dead (AL1983.002)"] as well as the works from the group "Inhalt der Gefässe" ["The Contents of the Vessels"] (1980 to 1990) are dedicated to Lichtsteiner's exploration of his role as an artist, the medium of paint as skin on the canvas, and his perception of the image as a metaphorical "vessel". When is painting purely painting? At which point does it become representational? While a picture might inspire reminiscences in viewers, to Lichtsteiner it is a metaphor

for the questions he has been exploring in painting for decades. We think we are looking at paint buckets, flowing colours or a branch in "Ast (AL1994.018)" ["Branch (AL1994.018)"] (1994). The artist, however, was not attempting to represent anything in the traditional sense.

In 1997 Lichtsteiner made a radical, uncompromising shift from colour to shades of grey, to the realm of non-colour. He created series which are often interpreted as pictures of birches or mountains. But once again, his focus was not on birch bark or specific mountain ranges, but rather on producing experimental arrangements, declinations of his explorations with paint and ground.

After creating various smaller pieces, he captured the solutions he deemed valid on large canvases (244 x 320 cm). The evolvement in this series becomes apparent when viewed in chronological order. Lichtsteiner developed this plan early on – in 2006 he procured the materials he would need for eight paintings. He completed the last two works with this exhibition in mind.

The course of time, but above all, his intensive exploration of relief printing led Lichtsteiner back to colour: Since 2010 he has been following up the group of "mountainscapes" with polychrome paintings. The parts viewers might interpret as snow remain predominantly white, the occasional "skies" are pale, while the "rock formations"

appear in oscillating, soft to intense colour modulations. Hence, the seventh and eighth monumental formats are also polychrome and summarise this development.

Struck by the contrast between the seemingly figurative works and the metaphorical, conceptual essence of the ruminations on painting that inspired them, viewers will feel compelled to take a closer look and to question their first impressions.
